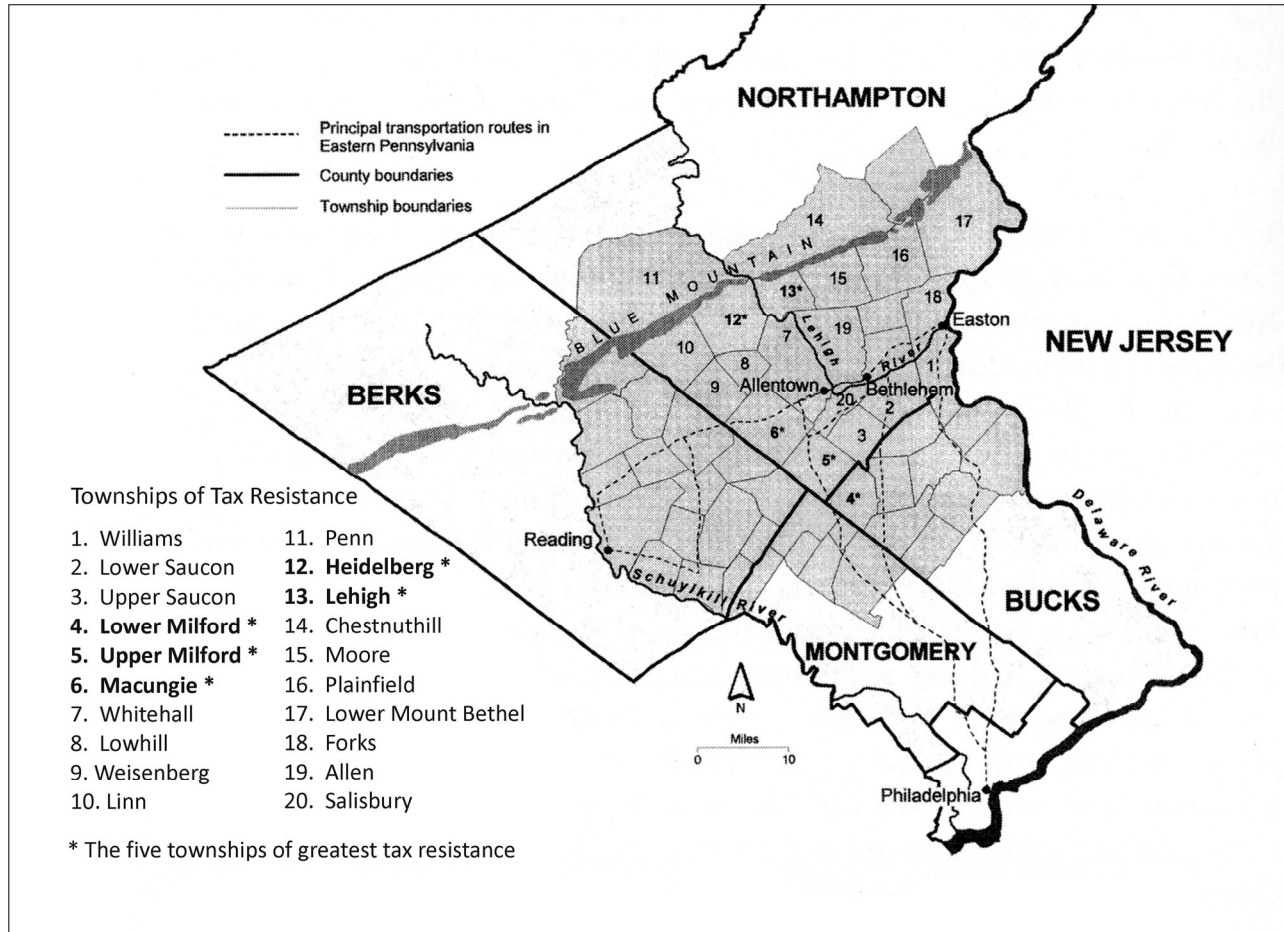


Townships of Tax Resistance during the Rebellion of 1798–99

This map shows graphically that tax resistance was widespread in southeastern Pennsylvania. The shaded area shows the extent of the resistance movement. The townships marked with a star are where the strongest opposition to the house tax developed.

The county lines shown here depict the political geography at the time of the Fries Rebellion. Bucks is one of the three original counties of 1682. Northampton County dates from 1752, and Montgomery County from 1784. Lehigh County was created later, in 1812. The earliest township in the area of the protest was Upper Milford (then in Bucks County), established in 1738.
