OLD HOUSE REGISTRY INTRODUCTION

Because so many old homes have disappeared over the past few decades as roads have expanded and housing developments have sprung up in our township, we in the Historical Society are trying to develop and maintain a record of the remaining old homes. We are interested in how they were built, their dimensions, special features, and their appearance. Our older homes have unique features and history shared by few or no other homes. These houses are special and call for special care.

We are defining old homes as those built before 1900. However, we will also include any others of such a unique nature as to warrant attention.

Other buildings, such as barns, springhouses and bakeovens disappear from the landscape even faster than the dwelling houses. They also contain much information about how people lived in earlier centuries and should be a part of this registry.

The following pages are worksheets that will help you to describe your home's dimensions, features, and history. Feel free to attach any additional information you feel is pertinent. Number additional pages with a letter (for example page 3, b; page 3, c). Place the name of your home (the one you selected for page 2) at the top of each page.

Please draw a sketch map of your property. We are not interested in boundary lines, but the relationship of your house to roads and other buildings on your property. Include the north-south orientation. If you know the location of buildings no longer standing, mark these also. Indicate the kind of all structure and the age, even if only as "new garage" or "very old springhouse."

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FLOOR PLAN

Draw a simple sketch of the main floors in your home, showing the walls, doors, and location of windows. It would be useful if you could provide sketches of the basement/s and attic/s and indicate if floor joists in the basement and rafters in the attic were hand-hewn or sawn.

Feel free to add notes and indicate anything that you find of particular interest, e.g. door, window, cornice moldings, chair rails, built-in cupboards etc., and indicate if they appear to be original or modern additions.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographs can describe features better than words. If you use a digital camera, provide a CD with the images as either print-quality jpegs or tiffs, not low-resolution images for Internet viewing.

The pictures we are looking for are of the front, back, and sides of your house, other buildings such as barns and springhouses, detail shots of old doors and windows, moldings on the interior, fireplaces, stairways, and any other structures you feel are special or interesting in your home.

The elevation shots (all sides of your building) are particularly useful. Make a photocopy of each photo and mark the orientation of the elevation (i.e. north, south, east or west end of house). If you can key this to the site map on page 4, this would be very helpful. Attach each photograph to its photocopy, or make sure you identify the photocopy with the same number or name as the digital copy.
