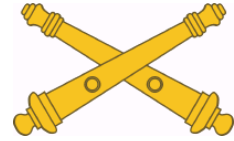

**Donald Llewellyn Long**  
**Private First Class U.S. Army**  
**19 September 1945 – March 1947**

Donald was born on 25 November 1927 in Wescosville, Pennsylvania, where he attended grades 1–8 from 1933 to 1940. He attended 9<sup>th</sup> grade at Raub School in Allentown, Pennsylvania, and graduated from Allentown High School in 1945. Donald was drafted into the Army as a Private on 19 September 1945 and assigned to Fort Bragg, North Carolina, for basic training and training for the Field Artillery on the 105 mm Howitzer. Upon completion of training, he was assigned to Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, for further transfer overseas. He sailed for the European Theater of Operations aboard a Liberty Ship, crossing heavy seas and arriving in Bremerhaven, Germany, in late 1945. He served in Germany with the Army of Occupation Forces for the remainder of his service, with assignments in Frankfurt, Kitzingen, Munich, Elsenfeld, and Sonthofen. While in Sonthofen, Donald was trained as a Radio Operator and performed constabulary duty, operating a radio in patrol vehicles. He returned to the States for discharge as a Private First Class at Fort Dix, New Jersey, in March 1947. He then went to work at Western Electric Corporation in Allentown, working on layout for vacuum tubes until 1957 when he became part owner and operator of Fenstermaker's Market in Emmaus, Pennsylvania, along with his father-in-law and brother-in-law, **Walter Fenstermaker** and **Walter Fenstermaker Jr.** Donald retired from the market in 1984. Donald married **Anna Mae Fenstermaker** (4 June 1929 – 3 April 2004) on 25 March 1950 in Emmaus, where they settled. Anna Mae also worked for the family market as a Bookkeeper. She is buried in Northwood Cemetery in Emmaus. Donald and Anna Mae had one child, a daughter, **Patricia Ann Long**. Donald's parents were **Herbert Phaon Long** (19 January 1901 – 14 May 1991) and **Florence Irene Bortz** (21 November 1902 – October 1972). Both are buried at St. Paul's Church cemetery in Trexlertown, Pennsylvania.
